PARTNERSHIP IS THE ANSWER FOR LINN PRODUCTS

Linn Products' team in Charlotte has been working with the Capital Area Michigan Works! Business Services Team for so long they know almost as many acronyms as we do. From OJTs to WorkKeys to Pure Michigan Talent Connect, for more than two decades staff at Linn and the Charlotte Service Center have worked hand-in-hand.

"I've thought to myself, if CAMW! wasn't here, where else would I have the resources," says Denise Hummel, human resource manager at Linn. "I don't know what I would do if CAMW! wasn't here."

The gratitude is mutual.

"It's been a real privilege working with Linn Products over the years," says Capital Area Michigan Works! Charlotte Service Center Director Tim Price. Julie Wertz feels privileged too. She was out of work and getting discouraged. She loved the idea of working for a hometown company but her skills weren't what the company needed. Through Capital Area Michigan Works!, she was able to upgrade her basic computer skills, and through On-the-Job Training, Linn was able to provide her with additional training to bring her on.

Julie is now a project engineer technician at Linn Products and is bringing all of her skills and experience to the company. "Never underestimate your worth and what you can contribute to a future employer," she says. "You never know when you have the answers somebody else is looking for."

TRAINING LEADS TO HIGHER WAGES

In WIA Adult, 172 participants were enrolled in training programs and 148 completed with a credential while 149 participants were placed in employment with an average hourly wage of \$14.92, including some participants carried in from previous years. In WIA Dislocated Worker, 171 participants were enrolled in training programs and 95 completed with a credential while 199 participants were placed into employment with an average hourly wage of \$15.63, including some participants carried in from previous years.

WIA YOUTH PROGRAMS BUILD BRIGHT FUTURES

Capital Area Michigan Works! helped hundreds of youth build brighter futures during Program Year 2013 (PY13). The Workforce Investment Act (WIA) Youth Programs served 726 older and younger youth, including helping 221 students receive credentials from a college, university or training program, or by obtaining their high school diploma or GED.

MAKING IT TO THE TOP... AND THEN SOME

Dominique Johnson graduated high school with college credit and went directly into a full-time job, but he still isn't satisfied. The 1st S.T.E.P. (School to Training and Employment Program) graduate and control room operator trainee for the Lansing Board of Water and Light (BWL) wants to make it to the top of the company he loves.

Facing an aging workforce, BWL General Manager Peter Lark thinks that's great news.

"1st S.T.E.P. is the kind of program that is good on a number of levels," says Lark. "It's good for students as they make their way in the world, it's good for the Board of Water and Light as we look for solutions to filling trade positions with qualified talent and it's good for the community as it helps to engage the next generation of the workforce."

Capital Area Michigan Works! collaborates with the BWL to help recruit, screen and hire candidates for 1st S.T.E.P., a hands-on learning program that engages high school students in energy careers. Students receive on-the-job training, an hourly wage and college courses, as well as scholarships and job opportunities post-graduation.

It's an innovative effort, but Dallas Burdick, who coordinates the program at BWL, thinks there's even more potential to engage and grow young talent.

"Can you imagine the potential for exponential growth in the Lansing area if more and more businesses did something similar to the 1st S.T.E.P. program?"

Dominique agrees.

"I want to make sure that every kid out there who is like me-kids who don't know what they want to do when they grow up-has an opportunity like I've had to do something positive with their lives."

E-PATHWAYS DRIVEN BY EMPLOYER DEMAND

When we think of IT workers, many of us picture young guys on scooters flying down the halls of Google. Steve Demeulenaere doesn't quite fit that description. After years of working in the semiconductor industry and then as a personal trainer, he found himself unemployed.

His wife heard of a program called Capital Area Tech Knowledge E-Pathways and suggested he consider training for a career in IT.

Now he encourages others to do the same.

"I was 39 when I started the program, so you can't say you're too old for this."

The Capital Area IT Council launched the program with a \$4.4 million federal grant to help council members who consistently struggled with having enough talent to fill job openings.

"E-Pathways is here to address workforce retraining needs by taking the IT positions we know are very high in demand and taking professionals and retraining them for those IT careers," says council Executive Director Andrea Ragan. "It's really about the connections," says Todd Vanhouten, Vertafore's software development manager. "We're not necessarily a household name and don't ever expect to be. That's where the IT council really comes in big for us."

And E-Pathways delivered with Steve. He is now a software engineer at the company and has already doubled his programming languages. He's so passionate about his new career he regularly encourages others to head into the classroom and get some new skills.

"It's great whenever someone can find value in a program so much they're willing to give back," says Traci Munson, who coordinates the E-Pathways program for Capital Area Michigan Works! "With Steve, it was like, 'Thanks for the opportunity, now I want to help somebody have the same experiences and successes I've had.' It's a great outcome."

When Michigan State University began building a cyclotron more than 50 years ago, few could have predicted the true impact it would have on the region, and the unique challenges that would come with building a high-tech business inspired by it.

Niowave, which designs and builds superconductor accelerators, knows this challenge all too well. As a growing company, it participates in the Capital Area Manufacturing Council to connect with its peers and increase competitiveness.

"It's beneficial to hear about what other organizations are doing. It helps us and the community take it to the top and remain cutting edge in manufacturing," says Jerry Hollister, chief operating officer at Niowave.

"As we're trying to build up manufacturing in the state, these councils allow for synergistic collaborations that you wouldn't otherwise be aware of."

One of those collaborations is Niowave's use of Capital Area Michigan Works! On-the-Job Training (OJT), a program to help unemployed workers get on-the-job skills to fill today's jobs,

while helping fund the training period wages for the employer.

"It's special to be a part of getting talent retrained while simultaneously meeting the needs of the employer," says Jim Bunn, Business Services Team liaison at Capital Area Michigan Works!

Xee Thor, now a machinist at Niowave, is one of those given a chance through an OJT.

"Looking for work is hard, but having the right people there helping you makes it so much easier. I didn't realize my skills were sought after. I'm glad I took the opportunity to grow with Niowave. This job means everything to me."









DIVERSE PROGRAMS SHARE ONE PURPOSE

THOUGH ITS PROGRAMS ARE AS DIVERSE AS THE PEOPLE AND EMPLOYERS IT SERVES, CAPITAL AREA MICHIGAN WORKS! IS COMMITTED TO ONE PURPOSE FOR EACH INDIVIDUAL TOUCHED: PROSPERITY.

There were 1,424 individuals enrolled in Workforce Investment Act programs for the year ending June 30, 2014, including 320 in the adult program, 378 in the dislocated worker program, 608 in the younger youth program and 118 in the older youth program, as well as some participants carried in from previous years.

The Partnership, Accountability, Training and Hope program, or PATH, enrolled 1,307 individuals. More than 530 were placed into full-time jobs, 180 were placed into part-time jobs, 572 participated in community service and work experiences and 589 received vocational and adult education services. The Food Assistance Employment and Training Program served 69 individuals.

The Capital Area Prisoner Reentry program served 575 participants. Capital Area Michigan Works! continues its partnership with the Michigan Department of Corrections to operate the Jackson, Hillsdale, Lenawee and Monroe Counties Prisoner Reentry Program, which served 475 participants, until the department brings the program geography into alignment with the Prosperity Regions.

Capital Area Michigan Works! wrapped up its Workforce Development Agency Electric Power Sector Grant in 2014. The more than \$1.3 million partnership with the Lansing Board of Water and Light, Consumers Energy and Lansing Community College provided more than 150 workers with utility lineworker training, apprenticeship training and more to serve growing demands in the energy sector.

In late 2014, Capital Area Michigan Works! received \$179,173 in Job Driven National Emergency Grant (JD NEG) funds to serve a minimum of 39 dislocated workers through

June 30, 2016. JD NEG funds are to be used to implement new or expanded local and regional job-driven partnerships that provide workers opportunities to participate in workbased or occupations training that result in an industry-recognized credential as well as other non-training reemployment services.

Capital Area Michigan Works! also received \$152,488 in Dislocated Worker Training National Emergency Grant (DWT NEG) funding in order to provide workforce development services to a minimum of 38 dislocated workers through June 30, 2015. Capital Area Michigan Works! will work with the Capital Area Manufacturing Council and Capital Area IT Council to strategically identify current and projected employment hiring trajectories to ensure classroom training paths funded through the grant are tied directly to the needs of local employers.



MERGER ALLOWS FOR ONE FOCUS ON EDUCATION

In 2014, Capital Area Michigan Works took a significant step toward reinvigorating its efforts to create an educated and prosperous community.

Members of its Career Connections Educational Advisory Group and local nonprofit Keep Learning... Our Future Depends On It voted to merge into one board with one focus: helping greater Lansing become more prosperous through a better educated community.

Together under the already established umbrella of Keep Learning, the leaders launched Keep Learning Week, a back-to-school celebration encouraging local businesses to get involved with local schools and help spread the message education is not only important, it's essential for the jobs of tomorrow.

STUDENTS REPRESENT REGION IN WASHINGTON D.C.

More than 52 students participated in the Jobs for Michigan's Graduates programs through the Eaton Regional Education Service Agency at Lansing Community College's West Campus and the Lansing School District. The programs are a part of the national Jobs for America's Graduates program, dedicated to preventing dropouts among young people who are most at-risk. Twenty-five of the "JAG" students graduated this year and many will return to the program next year.

Several student leaders from each of the region's Jobs for Michigan's Graduates programs represented greater Lansing at the National Student Leadership Academy and other national Jobs for America's Graduates activities in Washington D.C.

One of these students is Le'Trece Gonzales from Lansing's Woodcreek Achievement Center. When asked what she liked about Jobs for Michigan's Graduates, she simply shares, "It's why I come to school."

CATALYST UNITES REGION

In 2014, Capital Area Michigan Works! formalized its partnerships with regional leaders Lansing Economic Area Partnership (LEAP), Lansing Community College, Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce, Michigan State University and the Tri-County Regional Planning Commission through the Regional Prosperity Initiative, a voluntary competitive grant process spearheaded by Michigan Governor Rick Snyder to encourage local private, public and non-profit partners to create vibrant regional economies.

The Greater Lansing Regional Prosperity Initiative got right to work. It hosted CATALYST: Capital Region Prosperity Project, a full-day summit bringing together entrepreneurs, business owners, young professionals and community activists from Ingham, Eaton and Clinton counties to be a catalyst for positive, rapid and sustained progress toward prosperity for the region. Insights gathered at the event will become a part of the prosperity initiative's five-year Economic Prosperity Plan.

MICapitalRegion.com, a regional dashboard, was also launched by the initiative. The effort showcases community progress in the tricounty area through four pillars: Economic and Financial Health, Education and Talent, Health and Environment and Culture and Lifestyle. Information under each pillar will help guide the work of the region's key organizations which work to build prosperity.

Capital Area Michigan Works! CEO Edythe Hatter-Williams was presented with a Special Tribute from Governor Snyder for the alignment of Capital Area Michigan Works!' efforts with the region's prosperity initiatives.

The Capital Area Michigan Works! Business Services Team helped more than 600 employers with recruiting and retention strategies in 2014.

The Business Services Team also nominated two Capital Area Michigan Works! employers, F.C. Mason Company and Lansing Board of Water and Light, who were recognized with Prosperity Awards from the Michigan Works! Association.

Nineteen companies in the region received nearly \$1 million in Skilled Trades Training Fund dollars to train almost 700 workers to help them retain jobs and grow.

The Capital Area Manufacturing Council and Capital Area IT Council both experienced growth and worked with employers to connect high school and college students, as well as jobs seekers, with the region's in-demand careers.
